The WA Firearms Act Reform Voluntary Buyback Scheme





The Western Australian Government have allocated \$64.3 million dollars as part of the Firearms Act Reform initiative to compensate firearm licence holders for voluntarily surrendered firearms via the 2024 Voluntary Firearm Buyback Scheme.

The Voluntary Firearm Buyback Scheme opened on the 21st February 2024, and will remain open until Saturday 31 August 2024, or until the \$64.3 million fund is exhausted.

All WA individual firearm licence holders are eligible to receive compensation for surrendered firearms regardless of whether legislative changes impact their licence.

Mundijong Police Station is accepting firearms under the voluntary firearms buyback scheme, as well as the State's existing amnesty program between 8am and 4pm, Monday to Friday.

ON THE BEAT

February Update
with Senior Sergeant Richard Moore

Hi Folks,

It's been a busy week for Mundijong Police, solving crime and charging offenders with serious offences.

Yesterday afternoon police stopped a vehicle on Turner Road Byford. The occupants were spoken to and on searching the vehicle police located a homemade firearm, ammunition, stolen registration plates, a homemade sling shot and stealing a motor vehicle from Hearne Hill in December 2021.

This morning a Misuse of Drugs Act Search warrant was executed in Darling Downs. A 38-year-old woman from the address was arrested on two outstanding warrants and possession of illegal drugs. Mundijong Police will also be making inquiries into the 7 mobile phones located under her bed. At the time of producing this newsletter, police are still at the address seizing further alleged stolen or unlawfully obtained property.

Mundijong Police appreciate the community's assistance in contacting the Station or Crime Stopper with information about suspicious activity. Information provided assists in 'building a jigsaw' of intelligence allowing us to have search warrants approved and executed.

Hoon driving continues to be the main concern of some residents. Please report unlawful driving, if safe record registration plates and vision of the reckless driving. Don't put yourself in harms way. It's not worth the risk of been struck by a 'stupid' driver.

Remember, we're always here for you. Let's look out for one another and create a safer community.

What to report to the WA Police

The Police rely on reports from the community about where crime and suspicious activity are occurring.

Police patrols are most often targeted in line with reports from the public and the Police can only respond and assist where they are given reasonable detail about the nature and timing of an incident or ongoing issue.

Crime Stoppers 1800 333 000

Call Crime Stoppers or make an online report to provide information about any criminal activity and in some cases a reward may be issued. You can remain anonymous.

Crime Stoppers is staffed between 7am and 11pm weekdays and 8am to 8pm on weekends, but online reports can be made at any time.

For life-threatening or time critical emergencies, call 000

Hearing/speech impaired call TTY 106

Only use the 000/106 emergency service when an immediate response is required, to contact police while a crime is happening or if someone is in immediate danger.

Before you call 000 or (TTY) 106, decide which emergency service you need:


WA Police Force - Actively occurring criminal activity or an incident where there is an immediate threat to the lives of a person/ people.

St John Ambulance - Emergencies requiring immediate medical treatment

Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) - Fire, serious vehicle crash or severe weather event

For non-emergency situations that require WA Police Force assistance call 131 444 / TTY 106

These events non-emergency events include break in/theft that has already occurred, if you have witnessed, or are witnessing, a burglary or break-in taking place (the offender is still on the premises but you are not in immediate danger), property damage or reporting a sexual assault.

2024 Firearms Act Reform

Public safety through legitimate and responsible firearm ownership.

The 2016 Law Reform Commission Review of the Voluntary Firearm Buyback Scheme WA Firearms Legislation, recommended a complete redraft and re-enactment of the Legislation, placing public safety at the forefront.

commencement of the Firearms Legislation Reform. The Firearms Act Reform is the largest reform of the firearms legislation in recent history.

Port Arthur massacre, the legislation has had no licence. significant structural reform, only minor amendment since the 1970s.

Law changes will enhance public safety implementing stricter licensing and offences. It will also see Western Australia become the first state or territory to impose a limit on the number of firearms an individual can own.

While there have been several amendments to the Act over the years, there has been no structural reform since it was enacted back in 1973.

A Cook Government funded voluntary firearm buyback is open now until Saturday 31 August 2024 (or until the allocated funds are exhausted, whichever happens first) to all individual firearms licence holders across the State, with owners eligible to receive a maximum of \$1,000 dollars for their gun, dependant on type, style, calibre and initial registration date.

The Western Australian Government have allocated \$64.3 million dollars as part of the Firearms Act Reform initiative to compensate firearm licence In March 2022, the WA Government announced the holders for voluntarily surrendered firearms via the 2024 Voluntary Firearm Buyback Scheme.

The schedule of buyback fees payable can be found below. Payment will be made via bank transfer, to your nominated bank account. You must provide the storage bank details on the prescribed form when you bring it requirements, introducing compulsory training and and the firearm to the Police station. Firearm Surrender form

The firearm surrender form can be found HERE and must be completed before you attend the station.

Checks will be conducted on the firearms licenced to each person, and compensation amounts will be confirmed with you while you are at the station.

Ammunition may also be surrendered, but is not compensated. Remember that it is illegal to possess ammunition without the corresponding licenced firearm. Bags and firearm accessories will not be taken at the station and are not eligible for compensation under the firearm buyback scheme.

Mundijong Police Station will be open Monday to Friday between 8am and 4pm to assist. The surrender process will take around 15-20 minutes, depending on number of people at the station.

Please ensure that your firearms are unloaded and empty of all ammunition and carried into the station in a safe, non-threatening manner. :

With today's advanced technology it is possible to have remote notification of your fuel levels. Mobile and email applications are available to alert the owner to any use of fuel, generally for a small set up fee. Movement alarms can also be effective in reducing risk of fuel theft.

Other security tips include:

- Have fuel tanks located out of sight of passing traffic and if possible, consider locating tanks underground.
- Ensure tank cut-off valves and pump are securely locked. Locate any switches in a

locked building and turn off power to pumps when not in use.

- Monitor fuel usage and keep up to date records in order to recognise any unexplained loss.
- Place signs at entrance points to your property and on fuel tanks to warn offenders of the security measures in place and that fuels are monitored effectively.
- Fuel dyes can be effective in preventing theft and can be sourced from your local agricultural supplier.

The Shire of SJ is supporting our community members to get to know their neighbours through our Friendly Neighbourhood Grant.


These grants are available to individuals and local community groups to apply for financial assistance towards the cost associated with hosting an event or activity that will foster positive neighbourhood connections.

- · The event or activity must occur on public property in the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale.
- The consumption of alcohol is not permitted.
- Applicants must allow four (4) weeks from the date of submission, for applications to be processed and notifications issued by the Shire regarding the outcome of the grant.
- Grants up to \$250.00 (ex GST) per application are available all year round while funds remain.
- An acquittal (including copies of receipts) must be submitted upon the completion of your activity.
- Acknowledgement of the Shire for the contribution is also requested.

Give illegal dumping the click

Illegal dumping of demolition waste, including asbestos, is an ongoing problem in some parts of WA.

Crime Stoppers WA and the Department of Water & Environmental Regulation (DWER) are running a campaign dubbed "Give illegal dumping the click" from 5th Feb for 4 weeks, although the message is timeless.

The Serpentine Jarrahdale Shire will be sharing the 'give illegal dumping the click' the campaign message, and encourage locals, industry players and consumers to share information anonymously via the Crime Stoppers WA online reporting platform. This information will go directly to DWER investigators.

Workers in the demolition and construction industries might know who the rogue removalists are, dodging the law and dumping asbestos and demolition waste illegally. To keep their industry clean, we want industry insiders to share information to help stop this trend.

For consumers doing home renovation projects, they should ensure they use licensed contractors and ask where their home renovation/demolition waste is actually going. They're paying a fee for this to be done properly, so exposing any rogue traders will help prevent our landscapes becoming illegal landfill.

Don't let illegal landfill ruin our beautiful WA landscape. If you see or hear anything suspicious, report online, safely & anonymously via Crime Stoppers WA to Dept of Water & Environmental Regulation.
