The Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale, located in Perth's south east corridor, is Western Australia's fastest growing local government, and the third fastest in the nation.





Ready to build on success

The Shire has a proven record of completing projects with the Federal and State government, and we're ready to continue that partnership.

- Identified in Perth and Peel @ 3.5
 Million framework as key area for strategic growth.
- Mundijong Growth Corridor identified by UDIA WA as key to unlocking housing.
- SJ's land capacity aligns with major government priorities including AUKUS.
- \$1 billion Federal/State funded Tonkin Highway Extension construction started.
- METRONET Byford Train Station now open bringing connection to the Shire.
- Byford Health Hub a \$42 million State investment in partnership with the Shire. Work has now begun on site, and it'll be open in 2027.

A strategic link connecting defence, industry and community

Mundijong Road is more than a local road. It's a strategic corridor for WA and Australia – but like many of the Shire's roads it's no longer fit for purpose.

It's a major piece of infrastructure in desperate need of investment, and State-level oversight.


- · Key east-west freight and commuter corridor
- · Links major highways and industrial zones
- · Carries heavy vehicles, school traffic and growth
- · Defence Housing has acquired 100 lots in Mundijong, which will increase traffic along Mundijong and other key road links

Why it matters nationally:

- · Supports WA Freight Strategy and Perth and Peel @ 3.5 million
- · Enables housing and population growth
- · Connects to Westport, Western Trade Coast and AUKUS precincts
- · Community benefit: Safer, less congested roads for locals and visitors

Our ask:

- · Support the WA State Government taking responsibility for Mundijong Road
- · Recognise Mundijong Road as a national strategic asset in infrastructure planning



Infrastructure that keeps pace

Upgraded roads and community facilities are essential to support population growth and enable new housing development.

Key challenges:

- Heavy haulage and increased traffic particularly from sand trucks is accelerating wear on local roads not designed for current demand.
- Community facilities, including the Briggs Park Recreation Centre, require upgrading and expansion to meet growing needs.
- Population growth is driving increased demand for safe, accessible, and modern infrastructure.
- A comprehensive 2023 surface condition assessment underpins the Roads Forward Work Plan. The assessment found 40% of the Shire's roads (22% poor, 18% very poor) require urgent repair or reconstruction.

Sand haulage for major developments has turned these roads into critical heavy vehicle corridors, experiencing wear far exceeding normal WA road conditions.


charts the path forward but underscores a crucial reality: local government cannot shoulder this burden alone.

National significance:

- Enabling housing supply: infrastructure upgrades unlock new residential development.
- We need roads capable of supporting industry, commerce, and community safety.
- Upfront investment represents better value than deferring action and incurring higher remediation costs.
- Safe and accessible facilities that support residents, visitors, and growing families.

Our request:

- Targeted funding to upgrade key roads and expand essential community facilities.
- Support for planning and delivery that keeps pace with population growth.
- Increasing or removing the MRRG Road Rehabilitation funding cap for a defined period to allow the Shire to submit higher value applications up to \$5 million annually.
- Allowing reserve project submissions above the funding cap so that the Shire can deliver ready to go road upgrades when additional funds are available.
- Partnering with Main Roads WA and Federal infrastructure agencies to explore new funding streams and prioritisation mechanisms for roads most impacted by nationally significant projects such as the Tonkin Highway Extension.



Supporting Australians to age in place

In the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale, 15% of residents are aged 60+ (4,845 people), and this is projected to grow to an additional 5,000 by 2036.

Despite this, the Shire's aged-care facilities are not sufficient to support an ageing population. The majority of long-term residents must relocate for appropriate housing and care, leaving behind family and support networks.

This can be devastating for SJ's older people, many of whom have lived long-term in a semi-rural area with limited transport and strong community connections.

Why it matters nationally:


- Supports independence and reduces pressure on metropolitan aged care
- Keeps seniors in regional communities, boosting local economies
- Aligns with Federal housing, aged care, and regional development priorities

Our ask:

- Partner with the Shire to deliver targeted, accessible affordable seniors housing, and aged care accommodation
- Ensure homes are affordable and strategically located near transport and health links
