Sister Wossley looked after Byford's little ones from the Byford hall in the 1940s.



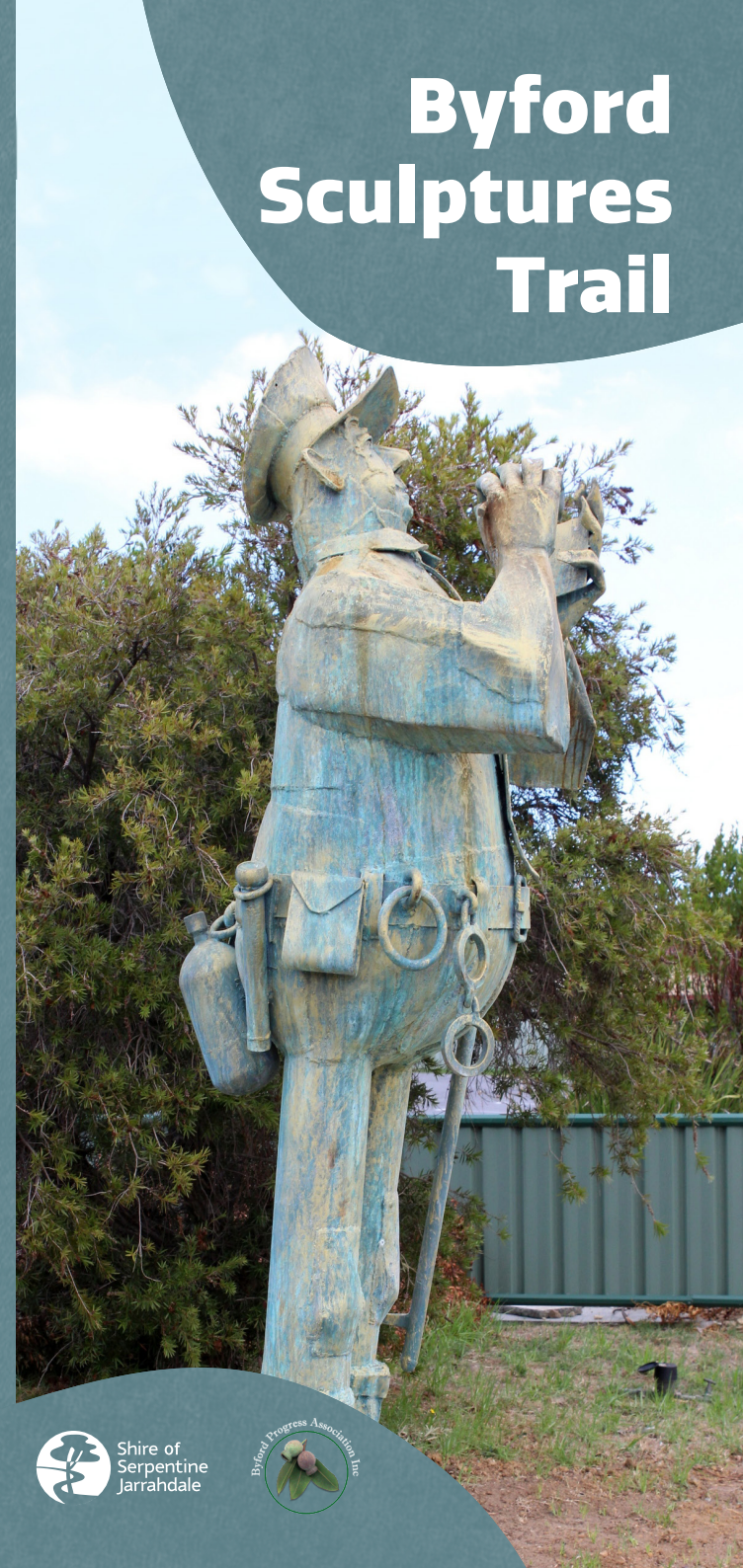
Returned Serviceman

These sculptures are the work of internationally renowned WA artist Len Zuks. He has had paintings exhibited at the Louvre in Paris, the Venice Biennale and the London Olympics art exhibition. In 2009 he won the People's Choice award at Sculptures by the Sea. After wide public consultation, he created Byford's sculptures of historical figures from ideas put forward by Byford residents. The works were commissioned by the Byford Progress Association with support from the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale.

- Start and finish your driving journey at the Dome Café to complete the trail in order
- Head north up the South Western Highway and begin the trail at No.1 "Northern Entry Statement" and park in the Information bay
- Drive south again back into Byford on South Western Highway to the "Traffic Inspector" and park in Jessie Street
- To drive to the "Child Health Sister" go east on Jessie Street, turn right into Edward Crescent then right into Blytheswood Avenue and park
- Turn left on to South Western Highway and park in the Byford Hall car park to see the "Returned Serviceman"
- Drive south on South Western Highway to see "the Brickworker" and then continue on to see the "Cockatoo"
- Turn around and park in the parking bay on the west side of South Western Highway to see the kangaroo in the "Southern Entry Statement"
- Head north back to the town centre, turn left into Abernethy Road then right into George Street to the Aldi carpark to see the "Boxing Kangaroos" and the "Horse and Jockey" on South Western Highway.
