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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

The financial statements cover Landcare SJ Inc. as an individual entity. Landcare SJ Inc. is a not-for-profit association incorporated in Western Australia under the Associations Incorporation Act (WA) 2015 ('the Act').

The principal activity of the Association for the year ended 30 June 2022 is:

To provide the means for the community to care for the land today, in a way that will leave it better for tomorrow. Landcare SJ engages respectfully with the community to encourage good stewardship of the land, air, water and wildlife. Activities undertaken include community education and extension; on ground environmental work to enhance, rehabilitate and protect biodiversity; biosecurity control; and, fauna recovery - in particular, supporting WA Forest Black Cockatoo populations through construction and installation of artificial nesting boxes.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, as provided by the Committee, unless otherwise stated.

1 Basis of preparation

In the opinion of the Committee of Management, the Association is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial statements who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. These special purpose financial statements have been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the Act.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards and Accounting Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 107 Statement of Cash Flows, AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors, AASB 1048 Interpretation and Application of Standards and AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures to the extent deemed relevant by the Committee of Management.

Significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

2 Summary of significant accounting policies

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

Income tax

The Association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*. The Association is endorsed as a Registered Charity with ACNC and has Income Tax Exemption, including GST and FBT concessions with ATO.

Deductible Gift Recipient

The Association has a Public Fund registered by the ATO as a Deductible Gift Recipient. Gifts to the Fund are tax deductible.

Revenue and other income

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Association and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

Sale of goods

Revenue is recognised on transfer of goods to the customer as this is deemed to be the point in time when risks and rewards are transferred and there is no longer any ownership or effective control over the goods.

Interest revenue

Interest is recognised when received.

Rendering of services

Revenue in relation to rendering of services is recognised depending on whether the outcome of the services can be estimated reliably. If the outcome can be estimated reliably then the stage of completion of the services is used to determine the appropriate level of revenue to be recognised in the period.

If the outcome cannot be reliably estimated then revenue is recognised to the extent of expenses recognised that are recoverable.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2022

Specific revenue streams

The revenue recognition policies for the principal revenue steams of the association are:

Provision of training services

Revenue from the provision of training services is recognised over the period in which the services are rendered. Contracts for training services are either fixed price contracts or contracts charged at hourly rates.

For fixed price contracts, the contracts include an enforceable right for the Association to receive payment for work performed to date based on the percentage of time spent including recovery of cost to prepare the training material given the tailored nature of the courses and therefore the criteria for recognition of revenue over time is met.

The Association recognises revenue based on actual services provided to the end of the reporting period as a proportion of the total services to be provided under the contract. The association's performance is measured based on actual time incurred in providing courses when compared to the total committed time in accordance with the terms of the contract as this is deemed to provide the most faithful depiction of the provision of the services. If required, estimates of progress towards completion are revised if circumstances change and any changes are reflected in the profit or loss in the period in which the change occurs. The nature of the Association's contracts are such that they include only one deliverable and the Association has therefore determined that there is only one performance obligation to be satisfied over time.

The terms of the association's fixed-price contracts either require that the customer pay the fixed amount in instalments over the contract duration or in some cases the association requires payment in full upfront.

Where payment is required upfront, a contract liability is recognised on receipt of the payment and recognised as revenue as the services are provided.

Where payment is required in instalments, at the end of the reporting period, if the services rendered by the association exceed the payments received, the association recognises a contract asset. If the payments received exceed the services rendered, the association recognises a contract liability.

For hourly rate contracts, the association recognises revenue only to the extent that they have a right to invoice. Hourly rate contracts are invoiced quarterly, and consideration is payable when invoiced. Revenue is recognised as each hour is worked.

Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Plant and equipment is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the assets useful life to the association, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

At the end of each annual reporting period, the depreciation method, useful life and residual value of each asset is reviewed. Any revisions are accounted for prospectively as a change in estimate.

Employee benefits

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Employee benefits expected to be settled more than one year after the end of the reporting period have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may satisfy vesting requirements. Non-current employee benefits being minimal, cash flows have not been discounted.

Changes in the measurement of the liability are recognised in profit or loss.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventory is determined using the first-in-first-out basis and is net of any rebates and discounts received. Net realisable value is estimated using the most reliable evidence available at the reporting date and inventory is written down through an obsolescence provision if necessary.

Impairment of non-financial assets

At the end of each reporting period, the Association determines whether there is an evidence of an impairment indicator for non-financial assets.

Where the recoverable amount is less than the carrying amount, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Covid-19 Disclosure

The ongoing impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on the operations of Landcare SJ Inc. is unknown.

The Committee acknowledges that the broader community may be impacted and this could affect the ongoing operations of Landcare SJ Inc., in particular in regards to the cost of additional cleaning and social distancing affecting operations including working from home arrangements. The Committee considers this impact is likely to be minimal and is unlikely to have significant effect on the ongoing viability of Landcare SJ Inc. operations.

As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. Our conclusion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Responsibilities of the Committee for the Financial Report

The Committee is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report and have determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 to the financial report is appropriate to meet the requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act 2015 (WA)* and the *ACNC Act* and the needs of the members. The responsibility of the Committee also includes such internal control as the Committee determines is necessary to enable the preparation and fair presentation of a financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

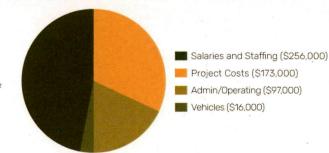

MESSAGE FROM THE

CHAIR

The fact that Landcare SJ has continued to operate all of its programs, meet the required outcomes whilst supporting partners, volunteer groups and the local community is commendable as we saw our state open up and Covid let rip. The fact that Landcare SJ is also in a solid financial position is amazing.

Recent years have seen increasing urban spread throughout the Shire bringing more infrastructure to support it. Minimising the disruption whilst maintaining the diversity of our unique environment in these areas has forced changes to some of the focus of Landcare SJ's activities and will do so into the future. These activities will still be part of sustainable land management but will include more education for local communities who may not have grown up in a rural environment.

An increased population and future tourism on top of climate change will also put pressure on the land and waterways.

This year saw Landcare SJ veteran, Kristy Gregory, and Reece Jerrett, explore other employment opportunities and we wish them well. However it is with excitement that we welcome back Jo Garvey to continue the high quality programs such as restoration of Shire reserves and areas of ecological significance through the planting season program, National Tree Day at Manjedal Brook, Banksia Woodland project, Brickwood Reserve, Gooralong Brook and Soldiers Road; feral animal control and community workshops.

RU OK Day 2021 was spectacular. Eighty plus souls met in the splendour of Gooralong Brook in monsoonal conditions for a morning of community renewal facilitating meaningful connections. This day is now a landmark fixture in the SJ calendar.

Everyone wants to talk about money, no one likes to talk about funding is crucial to community organisations. The continued support and funding from the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale gives Landcare SJ a platform to value add to its programs and support initiatives that otherwise would not happen.

Landcare SJ has been able to develop some profitable enterprises that have allowed in kind contribution to projects; this can be seen as very efficient for a funding body. Landcare SJ continues to support private landholders in the Shire of SJ through the Healthy Habitats Stewardship program – even though there is no current funding. Cockatubes, which have been described as the "Rolls Royce" of artificial hollows, were donated for replacement Black Cockatoo nesting sites ravaged by bushfires around Chittering and Bindoon.

Fee for service and Cockatube sales, which drive the Enterprises program, have enabled the creation of sustainable income diversity and improvements to long-term organisational viability. Our hope for the coming year is that a longer term agreement can be secured with the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale, our major sponsor, this will enable future planning and staff security.

I would like to thank all our sponsors, partners and numerous small businesses that have supported us throughout the year. A special thanks goes to the staff, Board and Management Committee, members and volunteers for their seemingly tireless effort to achieve Landcare SJ vision: to provide the means for the community to care for the land today, in a way that will leave it better for tomorrow.
