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Introduction

Authority

The Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale Vulnerable Communities Plan (the Plan) has been prepared in accordance with Section 41(4) of the *Emergency Management Act 2005* and forms a part of the Local Emergency Management Arrangements for the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale (the Shire). *This plan has been endorsed by the Local Emergency Management Committee and the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale*.

Purpose

The purpose of the Vulnerable Communities Plan is to document emergency management arrangements for concentrations of at-risk persons during an emergency within the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale.

Scope

The Plan identifies the demographic composition, geographic location, arrangements, communication, support networks for concentrations of people at-risk in the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale and the resources available to support at-risk persons plan for an emergency.

The Plan does not cover individual persons that may be at a higher risk during an emergency however information in this plan may assist with emergency planning at an individual level. Primary responsibility for individual emergency planning rests with the individual, family, carers or other support persons.

Objectives

- Provide information on concentrations vulnerable people and their related supporting networks for agencies working in emergency prevention, preparedness, response and recovery activities (the Hazard Management Agencies and key support organisations).
- Identify emergency arrangements in place for concentrations of vulnerable people.
- Provide reference material to support individual, community and agency emergency planning and preparedness in the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale.

People at risk

The <u>DFES At-Risk People Strategy 2013</u> defines at-risk as "*people who are unable to receive, understand or act on information, prior to or during an emergency*." Whilst we should not assume that all elderly, young, disabled or socially isolated people would be vulnerable in an emergency situation, the likelihood is far greater within these groups.

The understanding of personal risk may be impaired and/or episodic.

The 7 archetypes of vulnerability include, Age (elderly and children), Mental Illness, Cultural and Linguistic Barriers, Physical and/or Cognitive Disability, Socio-Economic Disadvantage and Geographic Location and Isolation.

Vulnerable or at-risk individuals cannot rely solely on the already stretched emergency services and must undertake their own emergency evacuation planning with the support of people and organisations who connect with them on a regular basis.

Related Documents

This plan forms a part of the *Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale Local Emergency Management Arrangements* (LEMA) as **Appendix 6** and should be read in conjunction with these plans and their related support documents. They also interface with other hazard specific, emergency management and recovery plans at local, district and state levels.

The *Local Emergency Welfare Plan – Armadale Region* (**Appendix 1**1 of the LEMA) prescribes the arrangements for the provision of welfare support services during emergencies.

Roles and Responsibilities

Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale

Prevention

• Development of Vulnerable Communities Plan.

Preparedness

- Work with key agencies to identify and create evacuation contingencies for high risk locations with potential for concentrations of vulnerable community members.
- Communicate information and conduct engagement activities to improve preparedness and evacuation planning for vulnerable cohorts.
- Encourage specific MOUs between like-minded centres or organisations.

Response

- Consider and advise on resource allocations in emergency situations.
- Provide this Plan and location information for Incident Management Team use.
- Customise communication efforts.

Recovery

- Determine resource allocation for affected vulnerable locations.
- Track recovery and any on-going impacts.

Individuals and Households

- Take responsibility for the safety of self, family and pets.
- Check up on neighbours, friends, members of clubs or organisations you belong to and people at increased risk in an emergency you may know.

• Be aware of self-capacity and ask for advice or help if/when needed.

Businesses and Community Service Organisations

- Undertake hazard risk assessments.
- Develop and implement emergency management plans.
- Ensure employees/clients/customers understand warning/risk/hazard messaging
- Ensure plans are in place to continue service delivery during an emergency.
- Ensure disaster risk reduction principles are embedded into service delivery guidelines.
- Tailor programs to ensure the capability of people at increased risk in an emergency is maintained during an emergency.
- Work with other organisations that support people at increased risk in an emergency

Considerations for at-risk persons, carers and support organisations

- Organisations managing facilities with concentrations of at-risk people should follow their facility specific Evacuation Plan, which should include procedures for evacuating beyond the facility muster point.
- If at-risk persons and groups do not possess their own transport or have, other critical needs should an evacuation be required, then they should make prior alternative arrangements or plans to accommodate these needs with their respective families, neighbours, or their support organisation agencies or networks in advance.
- Identification is important in the case of aged and infirm or children during an evacuation. Carers and those with responsibility should ensure that they could list, account for, and identify all persons in their care.
- Proximity of and anticipated response times by local emergency agencies. Do not leave it too late to call for help.
- Time required to vacate the property, including time to transport.
- Need for backup power supply should the mains power fail, especially night evacuations.
- Own requirements for effective internal and external emergency communications.
- Any need for additional assistance for care and attention in an emergency.
- Records should be kept by supporting organisations or services, to verify persons and physical status. Methods may involve identification tags, photographs, and documentation.
- Coordination of 'grab-bags, medications and other essential items for persons being supported to evacuate.

Preparedness Resources

There are resources available to support individuals and community service providers and their clients in a shared approach to emergency planning and preparedness.

Conversation, Can Do, Connect

Conversation - have a conversation with clients about their emergency planning and preparedness and the role and responsibility they have for their personal safety. Listen to and understand the emergency needs, expectations and capabilities of your clients. Communicate the role and responsibility they have to increase their own emergency preparedness.

- If there was an emergency, and you had to leave your home, what would you do, where would you go, and what would you take?
- Do you know how you would get to a safer place?
- Do you have family, friends or neighbours nearby who you could call for help?
- If you needed food, water or medication, would you be able to arrange/afford that?

Can Do - encourage clients to think about what they can do for themselves. Empower your clients to improve their own emergency preparedness by drawing on their existing capability and capacity.

Connect - encourage clients to think about who they connect with regularly. Create opportunity for community participation in emergency planning and preparedness by recognising existing networks and partnerships to connect with and support people who are at increased risk in an emergency.

Emergency Evacuation Centres

During an emergency, an Emergency Evacuation Centre **may** be activated by the Incident Controller in consultation with the local government and Department of Communities. The Shire assists the Department of Communities with this task.

The locations of evacuation centres are provided below to assist with community preparedness and awareness.

An Emergency Evacuation Centre may <u>not</u> be within the locality or even within local government area.

During an emergency, refer to <u>Emergency WA</u> for details of which Emergency Evacuation Centre has been activated.

Life Support Equipment

Western Power maintains a register of people with approved life support equipment. Applications are made through the electricity retailer (Synergy) with the following equipment qualifying as life support (as determined by the State Government):

Apnoea Monitor (for children only)**	Feeding Pump	Heart Pump
Machine Assisted Peritoneal Dialysis Equipment (cycler or heater)	Nebuliser (for children only - used every day for 1-2 hours per day)**	Nebuliser (Adult - prescribed when a tracheostomy is expected to be in place for more than 6 months where nebulised therapy is required for life support purposes)

*Adult - only when clinically prescribed for adults with obesity hypoventilation syndrome, tracheomalacia, obstructive sleep apnoea with sleep hypoventilation, or other life threatening disease as determined by a respiratory or sleep specialist with usage over four hours per night.

*Child - only when prescribed for severe obstructive sleep apnoea, tracheomalacia or other life threatening disease as determined by the treating Paediatrician.

** A child is defined as being under the age of 16 years.

Western Power will make contact with the Incident Controller through the DFES COMCEN to advise of properties within the warning area that are power dependent for medical equipment.

Should the incident be large enough to warrant an Incident Support Group (ISG) activation then this information would be provided by Western Power to the Incident Controller through the ISG meeting.


Individuals and their support networks should ensure planning and arrangements for evacuation are robust and considered early.

The Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale covers a geographic area of 904.6 square kilometres of which 98% is declared as Bush Fire Prone.

The Shire is bounded by the City of Armadale, City of Kwinana, City of Rockingham and the Shire of Murray.

Understanding the complexities of the community is essential for emergency planning, specifically knowing those with who may have limited ability to receive, understand or act on information, prior to or during an emergency.

Emergency management is a shared responsibility between government, communities and individuals. This plan aims to highlight vulnerable cohorts and encourage information and resource sharing in times of need.

Socio-Economic Disadvantage

Socio-economic disadvantage can be defined as people's access to material and social resources, and their ability to participate in society. The Index of Relative Socio-Economic Disadvantage is derived from attributes such as low income, low educational attainment, high unemployment, jobs in relatively unskilled occupations and variables that broadly reflect disadvantage rather than measure specific aspects of disadvantage (e.g. Indigenous and Separated/Divorced).²

The level of Disadvantage in the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale is 1040 (SEIFA index score). The locality of Mundijong scores 1,012.9 on the SEIFA index of disadvantage, indicating it is the most disadvantaged area in the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale.
