Flood / Storm


Extract from agrics seasonal outlook.

Recent conditions: growing season rainfall (since 1 April) has been decile 1-3 for the majority of the South West Land Division (SWLD), with some locations still waiting for an autumn break. Rainfall outlook for SWLD for winter, June to August and further ahead, August to October is for below average rainfall, based on a survey of twenty international models.

Things to consider:

- Minimal rainfall to date for the majority of the SWLD, means limited soil water (see attached maps) with some places still looking for an autumn break (either 25 mm over 5 days or 15 mm over 3 days [for dry sowing into a furrow]). Pasture growth is suppressed and water storage on farm is minimal.
- Mean sea level pressure over the South West Land Division is forecast to be high (high pressure system) until at least September, resulting in blocking highs, which will suppress rainfall from winter cold fronts.
- Chances of both an El Niño and a positive Indian Ocean Dipole developing from June.
 Models indicate both events lasting through to October. If an El Niño coincides with
 a positive IOD, there is a clear signal for reduced winter-spring rainfall for large parts
 of the South West Land Division.

The <u>Bureau of Meteorology's Water and the Land forecast</u> (average of 7 models) is indicating between 5-25 mm of rain for the SWLD in the next 8 days (7-14 June) from a cold front.



Bushfire

Extract from AFAC Bushfire Seasonal Outlook Winter 2023 - For the southern parts of WA, there has been a late break to the season and areas are experiencing below-average root zone soil moisture, such as the northern parts of the Swan Coastal Plain and Jarrah Forest in the southwest, and parts of Murchison, Coolgardie, and the Nullarbor bioregions. The remaining areas are associated with average to above-average root zone soil moisture. Rainfalls in parts of the Southwest Land Division are forecast to be below the median but cool winter conditions should alleviate impacts from these moisture deficiencies on bushfire risk over the forecast period.

4.7 Local Emergency Management Arrangements

4.7.1 WALGA LEMA Review and Improvement Plan

Simone Ruane, LEMA Review Project Lead provided the LEMC with an overview of the LEMA Review and Key Findings, as well as the Improvement Plan priorities that were identified through the local government testing process.

- 6 recommendations were made and have been captured in the Improvement Plan work being undertaken by DFES.
- Improvement plan subject to funding. Presently the DRF application was unsuccessful. The NDRR application is pending.
- Report to be submitted to SEMC for endorsement.

LEMA and the responsibilities of local government are not well understood by Elected Members. Local Governments do find it difficult to integrate it into Business As Usual and as an informing document as part of the Integrated Planning and Reporting Framework.

4.7.2 Vulnerable Communities Plan

A draft plan was provided to LEMC members for feedback.

The objectives of the plan are

- Provide information on concentrations vulnerable people and their related supporting networks for agencies working in emergency prevention, preparedness, response and recovery activities (the Hazard Management Agencies and key support organisations).
- Identify emergency arrangements in place for concentrations of vulnerable people.
- Provide reference material to support individual, community and agency emergency planning and preparedness in the Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale.

5.1 Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale

5.1.1 LEMC Annual Report

5.2 Shire President

Cr Rich thanked the Shire's CESM and Brigades for the response to the fire at Whitby.

Officers advised that the Shire is following up this incident with residents in Whitby regarding preparedness information and emergency access arrangements.

Cr Rich queried the Federal Government's Disaster Ready Fund award of funding covering a large number of local governments. District Officer Paul Southam advised it appears to be for the upgrading of Fire History datasets using fire severity dynamics. Agencies share Bush Fire Risk Management Planning and mapping datasets.

5.3 Karnet Prison Farm

The Section 95 program for mitigation works has been successful. Investigating application of the program from other Prisons in the state.

AMENDMENTS TO SUITE OF STATE EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT DOCUMENTS

State EM Policy 5.12 - Funding Arrangements for Emergency Response

- State EM Policy 5.12 has been reviewed to clarify funding arrangements in an emergency response.
- A key outcome of the review was to clarify funding for traffic management during an emergency response. The HMA or Controlling Agency is responsible for costs, even if they direct another agency to engage traffic management contractors.

State EM Policy and State EM Plan Appendix AA - COVID-19 Recovery

- The State Recovery Controller appointment for the pandemic caused by the virus COVID- 19 has concluded.
- Amendments that were made to parts of the State EM Framework so that they did not apply for recovery activities are no longer required. As a result, Appendix AA has been removed from the State EM Policy and State EM Plan.

DEMC and LEMC Review

At its August 2022 meeting the SEMC endorsed the proposed project scopes to review the local and district committee structure. The objectives of the review are to:

- Establish clear roles, responsibilities, functions, and governance for DEMCs and LEMCs so they can achieve the strategic objectives of SEMC.
- Identify improvements to the governance arrangements and capabilities that will increase effective and efficient management outcomes.
- Create a shared understanding of the SEMC expectations of DEMCs and LEMCs.

LEMA Review Outcomes and Next Steps

The <u>Local Emergency Management Arrangements (LEMA) Review</u> is a partnership between the Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) and WALGA, initiated in response to reports that current LEMA requirements are not fit-for-purpose for Local Government and that a new LEMA model is needed. From April to December 2022, WALGA engaged 100 Local Governments to identify LEMA strengths, weaknesses, and improvement opportunities in a consultation that included 10 in-depth interviews, 10 interactive workshops and an online survey.

WALGA's LEMA Review Consultation with Western Australian Local Governments:

Project Summary and Recommendations Report summarises the key findings of the consultation process to date. A more detailed overview can be found in WALGA's LEMA Review Issues Paper and an independent LEMA Review Workshop Consultation Report prepared by agdots.

WALGA's LEMA Review project will inform a Draft LEMA Improvement Plan being developed by DFES that will be tested with the Local Government sector during April and May 2023 and then submitted for endorsement to SEMC in August 2023.

Grant Program Updates

The National Disaster Risk Reduction (NDRR) grant program is established under a National Partnership Agreement (NPA) on Disaster Risk Reduction (2019-2024). It seeks to proactively reduce the risk and limit the impact of disasters associated with natural hazards on Western Australian communities and economies.

The NDRR is for projects aimed at reducing disaster risk and improving community resilience to natural hazards in Western Australia. The NDRR is funded by the Australian Government via the National Partnership Agreement on Disaster Risk Reduction. In Western Australia the State Emergency Management Committee (SEMC) coordinates the distribution of this funding via the NDRR. The Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) administers the NDRR on behalf of the SEMC.

The 2022-23 round of the All-West Australians Reducing Emergencies (AWARE) grant program is in the final stages of approval.

The SEMC endorsed a two-year schedule for both grant programs:

5.10 State Emergency Services

SES volunteers have been active in providing assistance in the north of WA with the floods and at the State Operations entre behind the scenes of a major incident.

With the recent weather, volunteers have been assisting other local government areas.

The Unit has had some recruitment success with the Variable Message Board messaging with 7 new members joining.

Participated in a regional exercise with the ICV.

5.11 Mundijong Police

Acting OIC Mundijong Police acknowledged the good coordination for the Whitby Fire. Currently seeking information on the cause of the fire using the Variable Message Board.

5.12 Chief Bush Fire Control Officer

Prevention

- Last round of MAF completed with acquittal being finalised, re allocated 60k of unspent funds towards verge mitigation works in serpentine.
- MAF application of +800k has been submitted for the next round.
- Brigades have been kept very busy undertaking mitigation burns across the LG with a key focus on mitigation burns on road verges.
- Brigades from across the SE region undertook a prescribed burn on Southwest Highway for Main Roads. Ongoing negotiations regarding reducing high fuel loads near extreme risk rated assets resulted in MRWA agreeing to trial prescribed burning as a method to reduce fuels on high fuel highway parcels.
- Recruits on the current DFES fire school recently took part on a prescribed burn in the shire, this is a great initiative, thanks to the BCOE staff for the planning behind this.



- Restricted burning period opened on 1 April 2023 due to early rains in the area.
- Unrestricted season also brought forward by 14 days and commenced 18/05/2023

Preparedness

- Recruitment for new firefighters has recently concluded with the members now undertaking training. We have picked up approximately 30 new members.
- Local training calendar has again been developed with 19 courses being scheduled between May and October.
- DFES have announced the location for the next CFRS will be in Byford, the station will be crewed 24/7 and expected to be in service by Summer 2024. Brigade leadership have been briefed in regard to the impacts this will have on existing response arrangements.

Response

 Crews from the Shire have been kept busy responding to local, metro and statewide incidents during the reporting period. All incidents in SJ remained LV1 however a few did reach 4th Alarm and required a multi shift response.
