4.5 Incident Support Group Activations**4.5.1 Serpentine Complex Bushfire**

Following a series of lightning strikes, a significant fire emerged in DBCA-managed land at Serpentine Dam. This fire rapidly escalated in size, prompting its classification as a Level 3 incident within the initial shift. Subsequently, a Level 3 Incident Management Team (IMT) took charge of managing the fire. Concurrently, the Shire established an evacuation centre and an animal welfare centre in response to the escalating situation.

- d) The shire Staff were in attendance for the duration.
- e) Community Briefing in the Civic Centre held on Sunday 5 November
- f) Standing up of the Large Animal Evacuation Centre by the rangers at the 70 acres lot Darling Downs. From 4 November to 5 November
- g) No animals attended.
- h) Mon 6 November Power outage at Briggs Park due to western Power works
- i) Attendance by Recovery Coordinator at ISG Sunday 5 November
- j) Hosting the Community information briefing Saturday Afternoon 5 November

4.5.3 Incident Debrief: Serpentine Complex Bushfire 4 November 2023**Welcome and Introduction**

The recent Serpentine Complex Bushfire posed a rigorous test to our resources and planning, necessitating the activation of our LEMA.

Overview of the Serpentine Complex Bushfire

Given the CESM's unavailability, D Richer, Coordinator Emergency Services, offered a concise description. Triggered by a series of lightning strikes, a significant fire erupted in DBCA-managed land at Serpentine Dam, swiftly escalating to a Level 3 incident. Subsequently, a Level 3 Incident Management Team (IMT) took charge. Simultaneously, the Shire established Community Evacuation and Large Animal welfare centres in response to the intensifying situation.

**Response and Operations Evaluation Review of the Shire's Initial Response:
Activation**

Communication delays regarding the opening of the Evacuation Centre.

SES not initially notified as part of LEMA activation.

Delay in opening the large animal evacuation centre potentially led to alternative arrangements by people.

Response

Organized response with well-defined roles;

It was noted that there was a breakdown in DBCA-Department of Communities communication.

Supply of large animal cages to Evacuation Centres by Community Safety.

Positive feedback for the community information session at the civic centre.

Closure

Conflicting information during the community briefing about the status of the evacuation centre.

Identification of Challenges Faced

SES query regarding activation process, prompting a review.

Availability of SES-sourced resources for the Large Animal Evacuation Centre.

It was noted that the street sign was missing for Evening Peal CRM has been raised and Community Safety is arranging portable signage for Identifying the route to the Large Animal Evacuation Centre.

Power outage due to Western Power's planned works impacting the facility.

Lack of notification about the outage affecting Briggs Park.

Uncertainty about the required generator size for Briggs Park.

Consideration of DFES providing a generator but ultimately closing the facility due to limited attendance.

Communication and Coordination Evaluation of Communication Protocols:**Internal**

Need for enhanced trust in the emergency management team among councillors.

Preference for written email briefings to facilitate distribution and maintain records.

External Agencies

Challenges obtaining information from DBCA during initial fire stages.

DPIRD's limited involvement unless the Local Government requests assistance.

Coordinator Emergency Services as the representative for the shire in IMT and ISG meetings.

Community

Improving timely notification to the community about centres' activation.

Better advertising/promotion of CLU team information sessions at the shire office.

Lessons Learned and Best Practices

Need to work with the Incident Management team to get more timely information out regarding the Standing up of Evacuation Centres, community Briefings and other proposed community engagement.

Develop a protocol for notifying the members of the SJ LEMC where there is an activation of the LEMA.

Open both the Evacuation Centre and the Large Animal Evacuation Centre consecutively where large animals may be impacted by and evacuation.

Prepare briefing notes for officers in attendance at community briefings.

Liaise with the SES to source equipment required for Evacuation Centres.

Determine the correct Generator size and source a supplier/installer for the Evacuation centres.

Determine the requirement for Council to receive a briefing/training in Emergency Management protocols to foster understanding of the processes.

Develop an Incident Briefing Template like a Situation Report tailored to the needs of the shire/council.

Need to exercise the Vulnerable Communities plan looking at evacuation of a vulnerable facility such as the Serpentine Village.

4.6 Risk Profile

Bushfire

Climate drivers (El Niño and Positive IOD) this winter and spring have resulted in significant rainfall deficiencies for most of the southern half of WA over the past six months. The very much below average root zone soil moisture has reduced fuel loads for grassland vegetation in the southern half of the state. However, it has also accelerated the drying of fuel in woody vegetation.

This has supported planned burning to commence earlier than usual in forested regions, to achieve key lower fuel areas for the Southwest Land Division. Ongoing rainfall deficiencies have induced moisture stress in woody vegetation and resulted in an early start to the southern bushfire season. Forecast warmer and drier summer conditions are highly likely to be challenging for firefighting, consequently increasing the risk of bushfires for parts of southern WA.

Department of Communities – Emergency Relief and Support Update**Current Situation and Enhancements:**

- The Department of Communities' Emergency Relief and Support Directorate (ERS) has been proactively implementing various initiatives to strengthen our capacity and capability in handling emergencies.
- These efforts are a part of our comprehensive preparedness strategy across the state, ensuring readiness for the 2023-24 high threat season.

Funding and Resource Enhancement:

- In late 2022, the Department of Treasury sanctioned additional funding to bolster the resource capacity of the ERS to 36 full-time equivalents (FTE).
- Appointment is expected by the end of the calendar year.

Response to Advanced High Threat Season:

- On 9 November 2023, the Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) advised that the onset of the high threat bushfire season had been advanced from 1 December to 9 November 2023.
- In response, Communities has activated the summer Early Response Team (ERT) roster effective from November 9. This includes the integration of two additional ERT staff members per on-call team, enabling a more efficient response to state-wide activations.

Emergency Management Preparedness:**1. Operational Planning:**

- Communities is actively seeking involvement from staff across the State to join the Emergency Activation Workforce, enhancing our capability during high threat periods.
- Emergency management responsibilities have been incorporated into the job descriptions of all Communities staff.

2. Equipment and Logistics:

- The ERS completed a state-wide audit of emergency management equipment, resulting in several improvements:
- Standardization of the emergency vehicle fleet and emergency response equipment in vehicles and trailers.

- Acquisition of four additional emergency relief and support response trailers, raising the total to 22 across the state.
 - Enhancement of emergency management reserve stock and establishment of additional regional storage locations with essential emergency equipment.
- 3. Evacuation Centre Audit:**
- In collaboration with Local Governments and emergency management agencies, Communities is identifying and assessing suitable evacuation centres state-wide.
 - We have enhanced our evacuation centre risk assessment process and commenced a state-wide audit of these centres for better-informed risk assessment during emergency incidents.
- 4. Exercises, Training, and Partner Engagement:**
- ERS has been conducting Evacuation Centre Training and Desktop Exercises across the state, focusing on effective response and support during regional emergency events.
 - In October 2023, we facilitated a Desktop Exercise with 27 partner organisations to test how Communities could work in a coordinated way with State and Local partner agencies to respond to the needs of impacted people and communities in the response and recovery phases of an emergency.
 - ERS also supported the DFES Dunsborough and Surrounds Community Preparedness Roadshow, delivering Person-Centred Emergency Preparedness workshops targeted to community sector partners and people with complex needs.
- 5. Capability Audit:**
- Communities commissioned Nous Group to conduct an audit to establish the baseline capability of the Emergency Relief and Support sector in WA, with a view to identifying critical capability gaps across the state.
- 6. Lessons Learned:**
- Following the Kimberley Floods, Communities has embarked on a Lessons Learned project. This initiative is vital for enhancing our operational accountability, continuous improvement, and strengthening our systems for future responses.
- 7. State Support Plan:**
- Following the State Emergency Management Policy, a statutory five-year review of the State Support Plan has been completed.
 - Based on feedback received, the plan has been renamed to 'State Support Plan – Emergency Relief and Support'.
 - The State EM Policy Branch at DFES has updated the State EM Framework documents, including revisions to welfare references and other consequential amendments.
 - Local Emergency Relief and Support Plans (formerly Local Emergency Welfare Plans) are being updated to reflect the new terminology.

Recovery Update

1. Kimberley Floods

- The Department of Communities (Communities') continues to provide emergency relief and support services to residents impacted by the Kimberley Floods.
- As of 07th of December 2023:
 - 102 people are currently in Phase 2 Temporary Accommodation.

2. Mariginiup Bushfire

- On Wednesday 22 November, Department of Communities (Communities) opened an evacuation centre.
 - 210 evacuees supported. 120 remained overnight.
- On Thursday 23 November at 12pm, Bullsbrook Centre for National Resilience (Bullsbrook Quarantine Facility) was announced by the State Government as an additional accommodation facility for impacted residents and volunteer firefighters. Overnight the centre accommodated:
 - 41 impacted residents
 - 27 firefighters from Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA)
- The Bullsbrook centre was purposefully designed to be used during public health emergencies, humanitarian efforts, or as crisis accommodation for bushfire-affected communities or other vulnerable Australians.
- 18 households experiencing property loss, additional 10 households experiencing property damage.
- A Local Recovery Hub has been established by the City of Wanneroo at the Wanneroo Civic Centre

Appendix B

Chief Bush Fire Control Officer – December 2023 Report

This report was provided out of session for inclusion in the minutes.

Prevention

- The commencement of the restricted burning period was advanced by 14 days due to a damp onset of spring. Although the restricted burning period began as scheduled, opportunities for burning were limited for residents, brigades, and the Department of Biodiversity Conservation and Attractions owing to unseasonal conditions.
- The prohibited burning period began with the issuance of approximately 40 permits in the past few months.
- The Shire has secured \$500,000 in Mitigation Activity Funding, allocated across 13 projects. Currently, 20% of these projects have been completed.
- Mitigation works are either in progress or have been completed since the last meeting:
- Kooribinjal Brook Reserve, East: Installation of fencing, including gates, to manage fuel loadings below 4t/ph by grazing shire-owned stock before the 23/24 bushfire season.
- Nettleton Rd: Mulching of five separable parcels along private property boundaries from Alcoa Rd to the Old Brickworks Road. This restructuring of available fuels aims to create a strategic break along the roadway for emergency services and reduce fire activity before the 23/24 bushfire season.
- Manjedal Brook Reserve: The area has been divided into two cells, each undergoing different treatments. Treatment one involves mulching to reduce fire impact on adjoining property and native flora and fauna before the 23/24 bushfire season. Treatment two includes low-intensity burns across 80% of the reserve post the 23/24 bushfire season to keep available fuels below 4t/ph.
- The Shire's second mitigation officer has commenced firebreak inspections from December 1.
- Fire information magnets have been distributed to residents with properties larger than 4000sqm, serving as a subtle reminder of the impending requirement to install firebreaks.
- The Shire of Serpentine Jarrahdale's Bushfire Risk Management Plan has been updated and will be presented for public comment at the December council meeting.
- Brigades have been equipped with business cards to distribute to residents seeking further education on registering private burns and checking burning regulation information. These cards feature QR codes linking residents to the latest information.

Preparedness

- The Shire's annual Rural Urban Interface (RUI) training exercise had to be canceled due to brigades being engaged in responding to the Serpentine complex of fires. Interestingly, the RUI exercise mapping was initially planned for the exact area where SJ brigades were simultaneously conducting RUI assessments that evening under an emergency warning.
- The Brigade Preseason forum underwent modifications this year due to the operational tempo resulting from the Serpentine complex. Brigades were equipped with a slide pack, and funding for a meal was provided, with these sessions taking place on station.
- SJ training courses since the last meeting encompass Bushfire Safety Awareness, Bushfire Skills, Structural Firefighting, Pump Operations, Advanced Bushfire, Crew Leader, 5 x On Road Driving, 6 x Off Road Driving, and 4 x Provide First Aid.
- Multiple Captain's meetings have been convened.
- Brigade leadership members participated in the DFES metro Pre-Season Forum.
- All strategic water tanks are operational, with brigades identifying necessary works during their annual inspections.
- Bushfire Ready Street Meets were conducted in Serpentine and Whitby, drawing significant participation from local residents. These meetings provided a valuable opportunity to ensure community preparedness for the upcoming fire season.
- A Community Safety Night Food Truck Festival took place in Mundijong, attracting substantial attendance from SJ residents. The festival, with a strong focus on bushfire readiness, centred on promoting community safety.
- SJ brigades currently have 245 Members. 179 Active Firefighters, 20 Cadets, 43 Support and 3 on a Leave of Absence.

Response

- Since the last meeting, several third-alarm bushfires have occurred, with the majority remaining at level 1. Following a series of lightning strikes, a significant fire emerged in DBCA-managed land at Serpentine Dam. This fire rapidly escalated in size, prompting its classification as a Level 3 incident within the initial shift. Subsequently, a Level 3 Incident Management Team (IMT) took charge of managing the fire. Concurrently, the Shire established an evacuation centre and an animal welfare centre in response to the escalating situation.
- In response to reported fires within the Shire of SJ, adjustments have been made to mobilisation protocols. During periods of high threat, a minimum of 3 brigades will be mobilised to all incidents within the Shire of SJ. Notably, brigades from areas outside the Shire of SJ will also be promptly dispatched to ensure the closest available resources are engaged in incident response.
