

Cat Local Law 2023 - Engagement Plan

PART 1

Purpose of engagement:

Gain feedback, any concerns and recommendations from the community in relation to the proposed Cat Local Law 2023.

Background:

The *Local Government Act 1995* offers the power for Western Australian local governments to make any local laws considered necessary for the good government of their districts.

The proposed Cat Local Law 2023 is a new local law, which seeks to cover the shortfalls of the *Cat Act 2011*.

Summary of project/proposal:

The Local Government Act 1995 offers the power for WA Local Governments to make local laws required to adequately govern the district in relation to community needs.

Currently the Cat Act 2011 does not have legislative requirements of owners that are in line with the community expectations and needs. Additionally, the Act does not facilitate the environmental and health considerations in relation to the detrimental effect that cats can have on the Shire. The Act does, however, allow for the implementation of a Local Law to cover nuisance, health and environmental factors.

The Shire receives ongoing complaints regarding cats wandering, creating a nuisance, cat hoarding (excessive cat numbers), health matters relating to faeces or spraying and attacking wildlife, domestic animals and humans. Currently these matters cannot be actioned effectively by the Shire as there is no legislation requiring the control of cats with these issues.

Unlike with the Dog Act, the Cat Act 2011 does not require cats to be contained or not to trespass on private property. The Shire currently offer customers the option to trap cats(humanely) on their own property and the Shire will impound the cat(s). Once the cat has been registered, desexed and microchipped by the owner there is very little recourse if the cat(s) continue to wander, trespass or continue to be a nuisance. In addition to the lack of legislation power, the likelihood of trapping a cat a second time diminishes substantially.

Similarly, the Cat Act does not have any legislative power in relation to cats defecating or spraying private property or public place. Furthermore, if a cat is to attack a person or animal the <u>only</u> penalty under the Cat Act 2011 is to destroy and dispose of the cat, which is not likely to be enforced on a family pet.

The Cat Act 2011 allows for a Local Law to implement a limit on cat numbers at a property and implement permits for numbers above the specified number, whereby the Local Government can implement containment requirements for the cats on the property.

In conclusion the Cat act falls short of the community's expectations in many ways and the proposed local law seeks to assist the community with the issues surrounding cats within the Shire.

Description of engagement project

FAQs	Q: Why is the Cat Local Law needed?
------	-------------------------------------



A: The proposed Local Law will clarify certain aspects of the Cat Act/Regulations and assist in maintaining the community expectations for cat owners to control and contain their cats.

Q: What are the key changes in regarding the proposed replacement Local law?

A:

- Limiting cats to 2 per property
- Provisions for applying for more than 2 cats (permits require cats to be contained to property)
- Provisions for applying for more than 3 cats (a "Cattery"- where cats are to be contained to property)
- o Provisions for nuisance cats
- o Prohibited areas public places where cats are prohibited entirely

Q: Will cats be allowed to wander / roam?

A: Currently Cats are permitted to wander on thoroughfares, streets and private property.

The proposed local law will have prohibited public areas, as specified in the last schedule within the document.

Additionally, the proposed local law will have provisions for cats trespassing on private property under the "Nuisance" section and cat owners would be liable to penalties if the cat was to cause a nuisance.

Currently cats are not permitted to enter upon or into any local government property unless authorised under the Public Places and Local Government Local Law.

Q: Will I have extra responsibilities as a cat owner?

A: Yes, cat owners would be responsible to ensure their cat(s) are not causing a nuisance to the community.

Residents will only be permitted to have 2 cats on the property and require a permit for more than 2 cats. Cats subject to a permit are required to be contained to the property.

Q: I already have more than 2 cats, how will the limit on two cats affect me?

A: Owners with more than two cats <u>registered</u> prior to the proposed local law being implemented will not need to gain a permit for those cats currently registered to the property.



For cats not registered or if the registration expires on one or more cats the owner will need to gain a permit. Any new cats brought onto the property will also require a permit where the total number of cats is over 2.

Q: If I have a permit to keep more than 2 cats and one is re-homed or dies can I replace it with another cat?

A: Any permit issued to keep more than 2 cats is for the cats specified on the permit, different cats would require a new permit to be applied for.

Q: Will owners be allowed to breed cats?

A: Currently cat owners are required to have a breeder's license to have an unsterilised cat and this will not be affected by the proposed Cat Local Law. All cats over the age of 6 months old are required to be sterilised, additionally where a cat under the age of 6 months is sold or re-homed the owner must provide a pre-paid vet certificate for sterilisation to the new owner.

Q: Will owners be required to have suitable enclosures to contain their cats?

A: Cats subject to a permit will be required to be contained to the property unless under effective control.

All other cats would need to comply with the "Nuisance" section.

Q: Why are Prohibited areas being implemented?

A: Some areas are environmentally sensitive, and cats have been proven to be detrimental to both flora and fauna. Cats are known to attack wildlife and dig causing damage to flora, additionally cat feces left spreads disease and kills wildlife such as bandicoots.

Q: Do other councils have Cat Local Laws?

A: Yes, Local Governments have implemented a Cat Local Law, and some councils that have not yet are currently in the drafting process.

Q: My neighbours cat is a nuisance, will this proposed law help?

A: The proposed Cat local Law will allow for a Cat Control Notice to be issued to the owner requiring the specific nuisance stop. If the owner fails to abide by the notice, they may be issued an infringement notice(s)

Currently and continuing with the proposed Cat Local Law, resident may humanely trap trespassing cats on their own property and hand them in to the



Shire. Cats impounded do incur a cost to the owner for release and their cat will be required to be sterilised, microchipped and registered prior to release.
